If it is found that the child does not permanently live at the stated address, unfortunately the child will be asked to leave. So PLEASE do not put your child/grandchild at risk of being asked to leave.

The Trecenydd playscheme will be held at Hendre Junior School and the Penyrheol playscheme will be held at **Cwm Ifor Primary School.**



Entry is free of charge so please encourage your children to attend the playschemes for an enjoyable social experience. However, although the Community Council is delighted to be of help to working parents, please note that this is a summer playscheme and not a child-minding service and children must be picked up at the appropriate times. The playscheme is not compulsory and as it is paid for by the Community Council, a decision is made every year as to whether or not to run the playscheme, so the situation could change at any time.



John Jones

Many residents of Hendredenny - and elsewhere - were saddened to learn of the passing of local character John Jones who had lived at 6 Pembroke Court since it was built in 1972.



John became well known for his habit of sitting in a chair by his front door and passing the time with everyone who walked by. He was excellent at remembering names! He regularly cut the front lawns of his neighbours and helped with cutting down trees, keeping hedges trimmed or other gardening and DIY jobs.

He was a regular and popular visitor to various coffee shops in Caerphilly but also used his bus pass to go wider afield such as Bargoed and the Rhondda. The photo shows John outside the Caerphilly Tourist Centre on the Twyn. For some unknown reason he is wearing the chain of the Mayor of Caerphilly County Borough!

He tended to look a bit dishevelled so people he met might assume that he was not very interesting but they quickly became aware of the breadth and depth of his knowledge due to his many hobbies and his extensive reading and studying.

He enjoyed sailing, skiing, walking, photography and listening to air traffic control on his radio. He also enjoyed travelling, cycling, motorcycling, as well as occasionally using his car, but mainly his bus pass! In later years he became absorbed in collecting firewood for his wood burning stove, so much so that he probably had about 10 years supply in his back garden when he passed away.

John was born in Cardiff in 1937 but spent his early years in Abertridwr and then moved to Caerphilly. He worked at Nantgarw Colliery and then at Aeroquip in Llanishen until he retired.

He enjoyed good health throughout his life but was taken ill just before Christmas. He died in hospital on 17th February 2018 aged 80. A number of his neighbours were at his wellattended funeral at Highfields Church, Cardiff where he was a popular and regular attender.

We will miss him, he was a lovely man, an excellent neighbour and a unique character.

Penyrheol Furnace

Not many Caerphilly people are aware that, at one time, Penyrheol was the red-hot centre of industrial activity in the area.

There is, however, little evidence left, apart from some remains of stone walls, to show that from about 1680 a major Iron Furnace producing


pig iron from iron ore operated in what is now the wooded area on the other side of the stream next to the "dip" Garage. This continued until it was closed down in about 1823, after a period of about 140 years.

This area was called Cae Pont-y-Saeson (Englishman's Bridge Field). Pont-y-Saeson was the nearby bridge over the stream, Nant-yr-Aber, which ran alongside the works and provided the power via a waterwheel to the bellows in order to blast air into the Furnace. This bridge was much later replaced by the present St Cenydd Road bridge next to the garage.

In its early years it produced about 100 tons of pig iron a year, rising to almost 700 tons a year towards the end of its life. This pig iron was transported to forges to be used to make various wrought-iron items. There were two forges at Machen and one at Tredegar Park

(Bassaleg). The early development of the local iron industry had links with the Lewis family of Van Mansion, but from about 1690 until it closed, the Morgan family of Tredegar Park was directly or indirectly involved; in fact the Furnace and the three forges were under joint management for most of their life and were known as the Tredegar Ironworks or Tredegar Works.

The map (from Old.Maps.Co.UK) prepared about 1875 (about 50 years after the Furnace closed down) shows the location of the Furnace remains and also marked is the Angel Inn and Bowls Inn.



"Hendre-denny" Hall is shown and the Penyrheol Pit (now the site of the Chicken Farm) and Tir Gibbon Colliery were in operation, otherwise the whole area consisted of fields.

The only reminder of the Furnace now is the location of two houses at the bottom of White Cross Lane named Furnace House and Old Furnace Cottage and the unmade road on the other side of St Cenydd Road opposite White Cross Lane giving access to a few properties is still shown on maps as "Old Furnace Road".

The address of houses on the section of main road past here was Furnace Terrace, and in Trecenydd was called St Cenydd Terrace until the whole road from Martin's Farm to Station Terrace was renamed St Cenydd Road by the Council in 1962.

Defibs up and running

PTE Community Council is delighted to announce that the three new defibrillators it purchased for the community are now fully up and running. One is situated within Hendre Junior School and the other two outside Penyrheol Community Centre and Trecenydd Community Centre.

Training took place in October and January, but the defibrillators are easy to use and will 'talk' you through the stages and will NOT shock if shock not required.

Unfortunately, the cabinets cannot be left unlocked in case of vandalism. The code to unlock the cabinets will be given to you by the emergency operator when you dial 999. The cabinets are heated so that the pads do not disintegrate during the winter.

Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) is a leading cause of premature death, but with immediate treatment, many lives can be saved. SCA occurs because

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the electrical rhythm that controls the heart is replaced by a chaotic, disorganised electrical rhythm called ventricular fibrillation (VF). The quicker VF can be treated by defibrillation, the greater the chance of successful resuscitation. Seconds count and the ambulance service is unlikely to arrive quickly.

07809 331200 service is unlikely to arrive quicklyenough to resuscitate most victims.

Mrs. Helen Treherne Golwg-y-Cwm, Lower Brynhyfryd Terrace, Senghenydd Caerffili, CF83 4GR 02920830666 Many SCA victims can be saved if persons nearby recognise what has happened, summon the ambulance service with the minimum of delay, perform basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation (particularly chest compressions) and use an AED (defib) to provide a high energy electric shock to restore the heart's normal rhythm. Each of these stages is a link in a chain of events that provide the best chance of success, but the critical factor is the speed with which the shock is given.

AED's are easy to use and the machines guide the operator through the process by verbal instructions and visual prompts. They are safe and WILL NOT ALLOW A SHOCK TO BE GIVEN UNLESS THE HEART'S RHYTHM REQUIRES IT.

If you come across someone who has had a cardiac arrest, it's vital to call 999, start CPR, get the unlock

code and send someone to get the nearest defibrillator. If anyone would like defibrillator training, please contact the Clerk to the Council via ptecouncil@btinternet.com or via telephone.

It has been a long-running objective of Penyrheol Trecenydd Energlyn (PTE) Community Council to improve and enhance the skatepark facilities in Aneurin Park, Penyrheol.

Although the project has suffered difficulties in accessing suitable funding or lost some funding streams, it now seems to be coming to fruition. Following support from the Welsh Housing Quality Standard (WHQS), PTE Community Council and Caerphilly County Borough Council (CCBC) a project partnership has been formed.

Although the final design and position is under discussion, agreement has been achieved on progressing the project.

Why is this important? Well, the young people of the area placed this at the top of their wish list some four-plus years ago. It still remains a popular scheme with young people today. But more than that, young people just need a meeting place, somewhere that's theirs, that they identify with and feel comfortable at.

It provides exercise in the open air and aids general wellbeing via socialisation. As our urbanisation continues and accessible spaces diminish we all need to recognise that young people - as an important part of our community need support in their key development stage.

Improving the parks at Penyrheol and Trecenydd for use by people of all generations is a key open space leisure facility. Additional improvements are also in the pipeline for the parks, I am pleased to say.
