Can I afford that loan?

citizens advice I do not think the company that sold me a doorstep loan carried out proper affordability checks and now I cannot afford to pay it back. Can I get a refund?

The Financial Conduct Authority which regulates the doorstep loan market - says a loan is unaffordable if you cannot make repayments without borrowing again.

Lenders must check your finances and situation - including future income and spending - to make sure you can pay back the loan.

You might feel your agreement was unaffordable if you were given a loan that was more than you could manage to repay and it caused you problems. If you think you are owed a refund, first complain to your lender. List the ways you think their affordability checks were not properly done, the problems this has caused, and what you would like to happen.

The lender must acknowledge your complaint promptly and has eight weeks to respond formally or resolve your problem.

If you are not happy with their response, or they don't respond at all, you can complain to the Financial Ombudsman Service using a form on its website.

Should the lender agree with your complaint, they may agree to write off the balance left on the loan or refund

some of the interest you have paid.

If they don't, and you have to take your complaint further, the Ombudsman can force the lender to write off the interest or even the remainder of the loan. and possibly order them to pay a small amount of compensation for your distress if they uphold the complaint.

The Ombudsman's decision is binding on your lender. Citizens Advice Caerphilly Blaenau Gwent can provide free and impartial debt advice. Call in to one of our offices or outreaches, you can find the opening hours at www.citizensadvice.org.uk, or call Adviceline on 03444 77 20 20.

Finally time to get our skates on!

Following a youth engagement exercise with Gwent Police to gather young people's views and aspirations for the area, Penyrheol Trecenydd Energlyn Community Council supported a motion to develop a skate park facility for children and young people. However, once installed, it become obvious that the facility was suitable for vounger children, but not youths. The skate park working group - consisting of Councillors, CCBC officers, residents' associations and skate park users was revived and consultation took place with youths in the area, to find out exactly what kind of facilities/ramps they wanted.

PTE Community Council is delighted to now inform residents that funding was successfully sourced for an additional skate park via Caerphilly County Borough Council's Welsh Housing Quality Standards project and the Community Council also donated £15,000 towards the project. Work on the new and improved skate park will start in the New Year, still leaving in place the smaller skate park for the younger children.

Although located in Aneurin Park, Penyrheol (as there's space there to install it) the skate park will serve as a great amenity for all the youths who live within the Penyrheol, Trecenydd and Energlyn wards and beyond, not only for skateboarders, but for BMX, scooters etc as well.

We will keep you updated on the project, the designs and public consultation dates via our website and in future newsletters.



message. I recall Tom as a large, gentle guy, who had time to talk and was always willing to engage in a conversation on just about anything.

As a teenager I recall him regularly coming across and sitting with groups of teenagers and chatting at their level. He knew these kids and knew their parents. He was engaging, interesting and came across as a knowledgeable man. Verv few people had time or any interest to sit and talk with groups of teenagers in a social setting. One particular thing I noticed as a young teenager was Tom's hands: they appeared huge to me, but I dared not ask.

On occasion, Tom was ridiculed for his strong Communist views, but he stuck with it and often could argue down many commonly-held views; sometimes even hostile rejection, particularly when he

canvassed for election.

Only in later years did I get an understanding of Tom's life history and an insight into where his beliefs and views had been developed.

Tom had originally lived at Salop Street in Caerphilly in a family of 14 siblings, leaving to join the Army at 18 years of age.

This took him to many parts of the world. I remember him saying to me, "People are people wherever you go in the world, they all want the same things." His army career took him to Soviet Russia, where his political views were crystallised into a lifelong belief.

Post-army, Tom earned a living as a travelling boxer with a fair (this explains the hands). Later he returned to Caerphilly and - like many young men at that time it was down the pit. He worked as a miner until 1965. Due to his strong and determined character, he became Chairman of the Caerphilly Workmen's Hall, holding that position for many years. He became a fixture there in his beige anorak, always chatting and laughing with small groups. He was very well-known,

very active and very proud of this position. Many will remember his opposition to the closures under the 'Beeching Cuts' in 1965 of the local railway passenger services. He led marches and spoke at rallies to oppose the cuts, (it's a shame that wasn't repealed, it may have alleviated today's congestion!).

His political activities led to him being selected onto the Welsh Committee of the Communist Party and furthering his political influence, just missing out on election to the Penyrheol and Trecenydd Council by some 38 votes. I recall my father exploding with rage when he heard that a "Commy" had nearly won. It was argued though that many young people had voted for Tom; fed up with years of socialism with no change.

Whilst many people may have said it's time to put my feet up and retire, as the years crept up Tom seemed to become even more determined. This led to his absolute objection to pay the then-Poll Tax, seen by many as unfair social engineering by the Government. Tom refused to pay and was jailed. This was still not the end of it. He went on hunger strike with a fellow internee. Cllr Ray Davies. Tom went on the longest with his protest, making him weak. He never fully recovered from this series of events. He died in 2005 at the grand age of 93, still a committed communist.

Whatever people think of Tom's political stance, it was borne from his personal life experience and reinforced by what he experienced as a miner and as a political activist.

What people may have missed is the gentle giant of a man who cared about his community. Cared and took time to get to know people. Stuck to his beliefs and committed to action to develop them. Supported his community as Chair of the Workmen's Hall, when many wanted to close it down. But most importantly, a man of gentle integrity and strong beliefs, backed up by a lifetime of determination. Cllr Steve Skivens

The Bowls Inn – Gone But Not Forgotten



The Bowls Inn, at the bottom of Penyrheol, finally closed in 2011 after serving as a popular local to thirsty customers for at least 150 years and perhaps more than 300 years.

The present building - which still remains as a Tesco - is believed to have been built in the late 1930's, however the photo shows the pub as it was in the 1890's.

The earliest evidence of the site being used as a pub was gathered from the census of 1841 and later in 1851 the pub was passed on to Eli Price who described himself as a butcher, innkeeper and farmer. But it is believed that an original pub stood on the site as early as the 17th Century, serving Caerphilly foundry and farm workers.

In the 1970's the lounge was fitted with a carpet striped to imitate the look of the grass on a bowling green. There was also a restaurant on the first floor and a "jug and bottle" hatch where customers would knock the door and wait to be served from a hatch.

The was also a meeting room for the "Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes".

I am sure that plenty of Penyrheol and Caerphilly residents have fond memories of evenings spent in the Bar or Lounge

In 2009 the Bar was used in an episode of Doctor Who entitled the "Vampires of Venice". You can see a clip of this on YouTube as well as a short history of the pub prepared by a local resident if you search for "CAERPHILLY – The Bowls".

The doors shut in 2011 as it was claimed the Pub was uneconomic and although there was a number of complaints from residents the pub was converted to a Tesco Express as well as two other retail outlets being built in the car park. Tesco opened in 2013.

The Bowls Inn – gone but not forgotten!
