Twin towns



Members of Caerffili and District Twinning Association enjoyed a warm welcome in Brittany this July during their latest visit to France. The Community Council is represented by ClIr Sue ap Hywel and regular exchange visits have been arranged over the past 28 years between the people of Caerffili and Llanbradach and their counterparts in Lannion and Ploubezre.

The visit this year started with an opportunity to browse in the famous Lannion street market before being welcomed by the town mayor with a drinks reception in the Mairie (Town Hall). This was followed by the annual boules tournament, with the Welsh team coming out on top after a tense competition under the scorching sun. The following days included a trip along the Linen Route, exploring the history of linen production in Brittany, a visit to a local craft brewery and a guided tour of the town of Treguier.

This year marked the 25th anniversary of the twinning between Llanbradach and Ploubezre and a plaque was unveiled in the town to celebrate the occasion. The hospitality was as good as always, with two social evenings featuring local food and wine and traditional entertainment. The visitors were also able to spend an evening at home with their hosts.

The Twinning Association is looking for new members to continue these exchange visits. Next year it will host a group from Brittany before returning to France in 2021. Membership is open to all and a programme of social events is arranged during the year in addition to the visits.

Youngsters can finally get their skates on

Finally, we have managed to open a new skate park facility in Aneurin Park, Penyrheol. I hope that this new facility is used and respected by young people from the area and it becomes a facility enjoyed by future groups. It offers a meeting place, fun and fitness opportunity in the open air and a place to socialise.

I feel it needs to be mentioned that, to achieve this new facility for people to enjoy, it took considerable effort by a number of people over a number of years. This, perhaps, is the real impact of austerity on our communities.

The original idea for the skate park was generated from a forum of young people and Penyrheol Trecenydd

Energlyn (PTE) Community Councillors due to concerns about outbreaks of anti-social behaviour in public places and a need to understand the causes of young people's frustrations.

The lead on much of the efforts to assist came through the late Cllr Anne Collins. I had the honour of picking up some of Anne's work after her untimely demise.

The effort to improve facilities at both Penyrheol and Trecenydd parks has involved many people and organisations. Additionally, there were other measures put in place to tackle anti-social behaviour in the area. Key people in this effort have been former councillors, Michelle Britton and Carl Coombs, Cllr Jon Scriven and Helen Treherne, Clerk to the Council. Key activities have included new equipment at both Trecenydd and Penyrheol parks, amongst other improvements.

The Prince's Trust Cymru, Gwent Police, CCBC and PTE Councillors have all been involved in several initiatives to tackle the root causes of anti-social behaviour in the area and many initiatives are ongoing.

One thing that emerged was that the Community Council did not have a great understanding of the needs of young people in the area, so again an initiative to find and support a Youth Ambassador to represent young people in the area was commenced and we are now about to appoint the third successor into this very role. This has brought new perspectives to councillors' views and provides a conduit for communication back to young people in the area.

The latest improvements at Penyrheol Park were made possible by the injection of finances and support from the WHQS project and PTE Community Council, all orchestrated with the support of CCBC officers and the hard work of Penyrheol Community Association, to get the work done.

I feel we have delivered on what was requested by the young people a few years ago, but perhaps the bigger story is that the Community Council has listened, responded and continues to communicate with young people in the area, so that some of their issues and frustrations are recognised.

Rome wasn't built in a day and the skate park took even longer, but the aim was to learn, listen and respond; this is the real story here. All aimed at assisting people in our community, which, for me, is the most important lesson.

The Inspector said, "Children enjoy and learn from a good range of interesting activities and experiences. They are well settled and relaxed in their surroundings and engage well with other children and their carers. Staff have good knowledge about the children's needs and provide nurturing, supportive care. The club is well supported by the provider and there are good relationships with the school where the service is held. There is a good ratio of staff to children and this ensures that children's needs are consistently well met. The environment is welcoming, attractive and exceptionally wellresourced both inside and outdoors."

The children are taken on trips, attend local organisations and locations and undertake sport and activities under supervision. The children also get the chance to try out the mobile climbing wall supplied by CCBC and help make their own pizzas with Pizza Boyo!

It's great when parents and grandparents bring their children along to registration and relate stories of when they attended the playscheme. The playscheme is free to residents of the ward and offers low-cost trips, along with activities such as 'bring-your-own-scooter' day, slimemaking, crafts, sports day and the much-loved homemade water slide!

A lot of hard work goes into making both playschemes a reality and I'd like to thank the headteachers and governors at both Cwm Ifor Primary School and Hendre Junior School for providing us with such excellent purpose-built venues."

Cllr Skivens thanked the Mayor for his visit and encouraged him to support other initiatives supporting families and children of all ages in the area.

Railways of Caerphilly

Penyrheol, Trecenydd and Energlyn residents still have access to rail travel. but were once at the centre of a vast and complicated railway network.

The earliest form of railway in the Rhymney valley was the "Old Rumney Railway" (not to be confused with the later Rhymney Railway Company) which opened in 1826 as a horse-drawn tramway and ran from the iron works at Rhymney down the east side of the valley to Newport. It was only used for goods traffic and the nearest it came to Caerphilly town was at Bedwas.

The railways finally came to Caerphilly on 25th February 1858, with the opening of the new Rhymney Railway Company's (Rhymney RC) single track line on the west side of the valley from Rhymney, passing through Energlyn and Trecenydd,

then via Penrhos, down to Taffs Well, where it joined the Taff Vale Railway (TVR) to transport iron and coal from the

Rhymney Valley down to Cardiff Docks. Passenger trains began running on the line a month after opening.

The original Caerphilly Station was built on this line on the site of what is now Trecenydd Industrial Estate. The Station Inn, on Nantgarw Road was in front of, and named after, this original Caerphilly Station. From a junction built in 1865, just north of this station, the Aber Branch was opened for a mile west to serve the Tir Gibbon and Hendredenny collieries.

By June 1865, the "Old Rumney Railway" had been converted from a tramway to a standard railway and had been acquired by the Brecon and Merthyr Railway Company (BMRC). This was connected by a branch line from Machen to branches from the Rhymney RC line, which it met at Caerphilly near St Martin's Church. This was used for both freight and passenger services.

The Rhymney RC had problems getting enough access to Cardiff due to their dependency on the TVR and eventually built their own double track line to Cardiff at great expense, which included excavating a very difficult tunnel, over a mile long, through to Lisvane. This line was opened in 1871, together with a new Caerphilly Station on its present site, and the original Caerphilly Station at Trecenydd was closed. The original link from Caerphilly to Cardiff via Taffs Well was finally closed in 1982 and has become part of the Taff Trail cycle route.

In 1884 the Pontypridd, Caerphilly and Newport Railway (PC&NR) was opened. This connected Pontypridd, the Rhondda and Aberdare directly to Caerphilly Station and on to Newport via the BMRC. It closed to passengers in 1962 and to freight in 1965. The Aber Branch was later extended right up to Senghenydd to serve Windsor and Universal collieries and opened on 1st February 1894 with passenger service and stations at Penyrheol, Abertridwr and Senghenydd. It closed to passenger services in 1964 and to all traffic a year later. Many residents will have walked or cycled this route from Station Terrace, Penyrheol.

Because of the increase in coal and iron production and resulting congestion and costs at Cardiff Docks, the Barry Dock and Railway Company (later changed to Barry Railway Company (BRC)) was set up in 1884. The Docks and lines connecting them to the Rhondda were opened in 1889. In 1901 a new line was built from the BRC line at St Fagans to the Rhymney RC line at Caerphilly and then in 1905 connected directly to the BMRC on viaducts at Penyrheol and Pwll y Pant (commonly known as the Llanbradach viaduct). This line was only intended for goods and minerals but was occasionally used for passenger excursions to Barry. It was very successful but closed in 1937. You use this route if you drive on the Caerphilly bypass from Penrhos roundabout to St Cenydd Road and part of the way towards Pwll-y-Pant roundabout.

In April 1908 a new station called Beddau Halt was opened on Nantgarw Road by the Station Inn. This became Aber Junction Halt in 1926 then Aber Halt in 1968, shortened to Aber in 1969. Finally, Energlyn and Churchill Park Station was opened on 8th December 2013.

The pic was taken, probably in the late 1950s, from a train travelling towards Penyrheol Station and showing the remains of the Penyrheol viaduct which carried the Barry line to Rhymney, now the route of the by-pass. In the background, on the hill, can be seen Hendredenny Hall and to the left St. Cenydd School.

Search is on for new **Youth Ambassador**

Following on from the very successful appointments of Meg Owen and Georgie Rees, Penyrheol, Trecenydd and Energlyn Community Council decided to recruit another Youth Ambassador. Before Meg's appointment, Councillors felt they were not in touch enough with the young people of the community and wanted to redress this issue. They really did want to know the views and concerns of the young people of today and felt this could only be done through the youngsters themselves.

Applications were sought from young people between the ages of 15 and 17. The candidates had to live within the Community Council's catchment area, or have a strong affinity to the wards, ie close family living in the wards, carried out

work within the wards, attended school within the wards etc. The Council needed someone who could relate to local issues and build communication links with young people within the wards.

The main duties of the Youth Ambassador are as follows:

- To be a role model and advocate for the community.
- To be the young peoples' voice at Community Council meetings.
- To attend Community Council meetings once a month (if available due to school work/commitments etc) and attend infrequent other functions, as required.
- To acquire the opinions/views/concerns
- of young people within the wards and to report these back to the Community Council.
- To take part in any supervised media/PR activities, as required.
- To set up a 'youth' page on the Community Council's website.
- To make contact with other youth groups.

Following the end of October closing date, Councillors now have the very difficult task of shortlisting. So watch

We have two thriving community centres within our wards: Trecenydd Community Centre and Penyrheol Community Centre. Below is a synopsis of what takes place at each community centre, written by the respective committees:

Trecenydd Community Centre

Trecenydd Community Centre is based in Second Avenue, Trecenydd. It is a busy centre and has many different activities going on. It is a large centre consisting of a large main hall, a small meeting room and two kitchens, one of which is a commercial kitchen. We are also disabled-friendly and have a free car park. We also have an outside patio area with seating.

The centre can be hired for many occasions such as birthday / christening parties. We also have an alcohol licence. It can also be booked for corporate events, we have a projector and a very large screen.

A Flying Start nursery takes place every morning. Monday evening, we have a Tae Kwondo class, Tuesday evening a ladies' bowls club, Wednesday evening there is a youth club, Thursday afternoon we have an over fifties club for a game of bingo and Thursday and Friday evenings there is Karate. Sunday evening, we have a bingo club. Anyone wishing to know anything about these activities please contact the Committee. We have a Facebook page and a website: www.trecenyddcommunitycentre.co.uk.

We also hold regular events throughout the year, including a St David's Day concert, a family fun day every Easter Monday with a children's entertainer and usually a free face painter and an Easter bonnet parade, tickets for which are £2.00. We also have our pantomime on the first Sunday in December every year (1st December this year and it's Jack and the Beanstalk) again, tickets are only £2.00 and children get to visit Santa. This is a popular event so please get you tickets as soon as possible from any Committee member. We will also have a Carol Service (date to be decided, but we will put information on our Facebook page.

Penyrheol Community Centre

Penyrheol Community Centre is based in Heol Aneurin in Penyrheol and has lots of activities going on during the week. The facilities can also be hired for birthdays, weddings, presentations, meetings etc at very competitive prices: £15 per hour for the hall, £10 per hour for the Lounge and £20 if you'd like to hire both. The Centre also has wi-fi which is ideal for meetings, a fully licensed bar, a large free car park, disabled access, large stage with lighting, one commercial and one smaller kitchen, full central heating and seating for 200.
